MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

More evidence is emerging linking the influence of food, both its major and minor components, on gene expression. Although we have known through the eons of time that food and medicine are from the same origin, science-based evidence has only recently emerged to provide support for these anecdotal observations. This has led to production of functional foods and natural health products, also known as nutraceuticals, in the markets around the world. The AGFD has contributed immensely to this process through its meetings and publications. The publications of our Division have been both in the form of proceeding books as well as papers in the JAFC. This year we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the JAFC, which preceded the formal establishment of AGFD and the start of its activities.

Currently, the AGFD has two subdivisions and these are "Flavor" and "Functional Foods and Natural Products" and this recognizes the importance of functional foods in health promotion and disease prevention. At the same time, such foods, if not sensorially attractive, may not be appreciated by the consumers, thus reflecting the importance of flavor attributes to the acceptability of functional foods. The mechanism of action of many of the ingredients involved remains to be discovered; however, interaction of a number of food components with transcription factors has been more and more recognized in recent years. In these efforts our Division has participated in co-organizing activities such as a joint symposium on Nutrigenomics at the IFT in Anaheim in June 2002 and sponsoring of the 11th International Flavor Conference (3rd Charalambus Memorial Conference) in July 2003 in Greece.

The Boston meeting (224th National ACS Meeting and Exposition) provides for an excellent series of symposia with over 20 sessions, including the posters that will be presented at the Monday evening Sci. Mix; some 140 presentations have so far been received. Input for Future Meetings will be solicited from all Division members in a meeting that will be held at 5 pm on Monday. This is following the subdivision meetings which will be held at noon on Monday. The banquet for the Division, as usual, will be held on Tuesday evening, this will serve as a forum to recognize recipients of the Division Awards, including the Fellow Awards, and Graduate Students Awards and an opportunity for networking.

Finally, I would like to take the opportunity to thank all the officers and symposia organizers for their relentless efforts, hard work and dedication. I look forward to seeing you all in Boston.

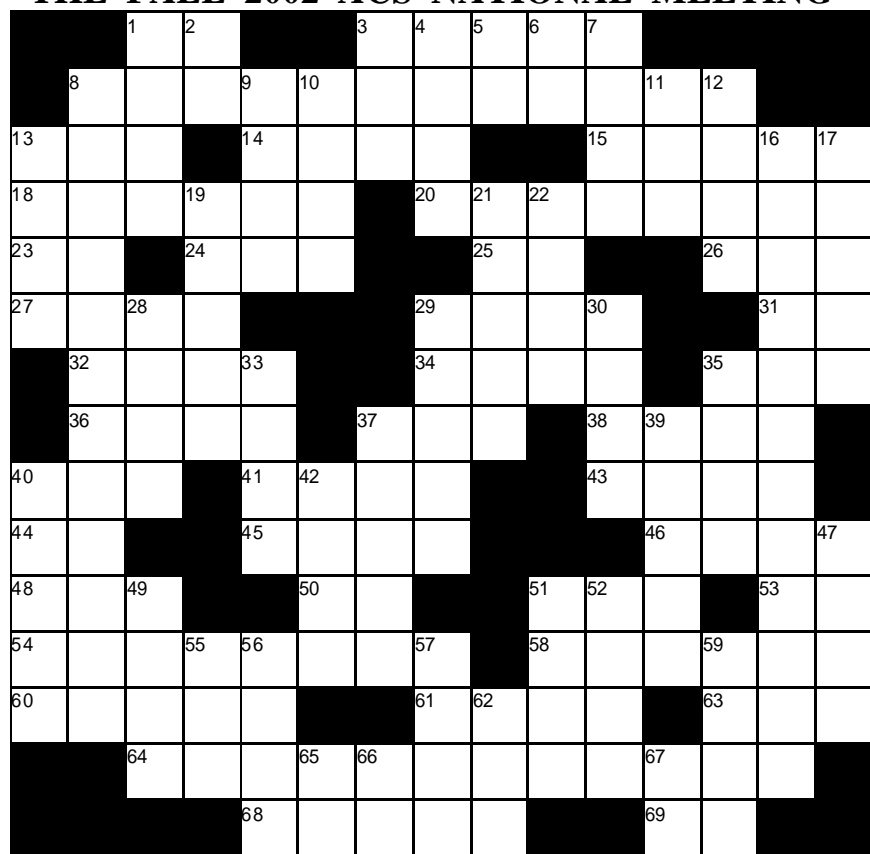

AGFD BYLAWS

BYLAWS OF THE DIVISION OF AGRICULTURAL AND FOOD CHEMISTRY OF THE AMERICAN CHEMICAL SOCIETY

BYLAW I

Name

The name of this organization shall be the Division of Agricultural and Food Chemistry (hereinafter referred to as "the Division") of the AMERICAN CHEMICAL SOCIETY (hereinafter referred to as "the SOCIETY").

BYLAW II

Objects

Section 1. The objects of the Division shall be those of the SOCIETY as stated in the Constitution of the SOCIETY. The objects shall also be to bring together persons particularly interested in the chemistry of agricultural and food products, both raw and finished; to foster programs of general papers and symposia on special topics dealing with this field of chemistry to promote such other activities as will stimulate activity in and emphasize the importance of research in agricultural and food chemistry.

Section 2. Nothing in these bylaws shall be inconsistent with the Charter, Constitution, and Bylaws of the SOCIETY.

BYLAW III

Membership and Affiliation

Section 1(a). Membership in the Division shall be open to all members of the SOCIETY. National affiliation in the Division shall be open to all National Affiliates of the SOCIETY. Application for membership and national affiliation shall be made in writing to the Secretary of the Division or a designated office of the SOCIETY and shall be accompanied by one year's dues.

(b). A National Affiliate shall have all of the privileges of membership in the Division except those of voting for or holding an elective position in the Division, voting on articles of incorporation and bylaws, or serving as a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Division may elect Division Affiliates who are not members of the SOCIETY, but who wish to participate in the activities of this Division. Such affiliates shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership in the Division except those of holding an elective position in the Division, voting on articles of incorporation and bylaws, serving as a members of the Executive Committee, or voting for Councilor(s) or Alternate Councilor(s) of the Division.

Section 3. Any member, National Affiliate, or Division Affiliate may resign membership in the Division by submitting a resignation, in writing, to the Secretary of the Division during the year in which dues are paid.

Section 4(a). Members and National Affiliates of the Division shall pay dues in an amount to be decided annually by the Executive Committee. A member or National Affiliate of the Division who is in arrears in payment of dues for one (1) year shall be stricken from the rolls.

(b). A Division Affiliate shall retain affiliate status only so long as payment is made of Division dues. A Division Affiliate's name shall be stricken from the rolls as soon as the Division Affiliate is in arrears in the payment of dues.

Section 5. Members of the Division who are members in emeritus of the SOCIETY, and who have been Division members for at least ten (10) years may request emeritus status in the Division. The Executive Committee shall take action on such a request.

BYLAW IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of the Division shall be MEMBERS of the SOCIETY and shall consist of a Chair, a Chair-Elect, a Vice-Chair, a Secretary, and a Treasurer, the number of which shall be determined according to the Bylaws of the SOCIETY. The Chair-Elect shall automatically succeed to the office of Chair upon expiration of the latter's term of office or if this office becomes vacant. The Vice-Chair shall automatically succeed to the office of Chair-Elect upon expiration of the latter's term of office or if this office becomes vacant.

Section 2(a). The duties of the Chair shall be to serve as Chair of the Executive Committee and preside at all its meetings, to carry into effect the decisions and recommendations of the Committee, to preside at stated meetings of the Division, and to appoint all committees except as otherwise provided.

(b). The duties of the Chair-elect shall be to serve in the absence of the Chair of the Division and to act as Chair of the Program Committee.

(c). The duties of the Vice-Chair shall be to assist the Chair-Elect in developing technical programs, with particular emphasis on future programs.

(d). The duties of the Secretary shall be to keep minutes of all meetings of the Division and of the Executive Committee; to keep roll of Division members, Division Affiliates, and National Affiliates and to submit the same annually to the Executive Director for verification as provided in the Bylaws of the SOCIETY; to conduct the business correspondence of the Division as assigned by the Chair or by the Executive Committee; to prepare and submit an annual report as required in the SOCIETY'S Bylaws; to perform such other duties as may, from time to time, be assigned by the Chair or Executive Committee, and to carry out duties outlined in the Constitution and Bylaws of the SOCIETY. The Secretary shall send abstracts of papers to be presented at the national meetings of the SOCIETY to each Division member at least two weeks before the meeting.

AGFD BYLAWS (continued)

(e). The Treasurer shall act as custodian of the funds of the Division, collect dues and other revenues, and pay the bills of the Division after the same have been authorized by the Executive Committee. The Treasurer shall maintain accurate records of receipts and disbursements and shall submit a report of the financial condition of the Division at the annual meeting of the Division. The Treasurer shall file the annual income tax return as required by the Internal Revenue Service and perform other duties as may be assigned by the Chair or Executive Committee or required by the SOCIETY's Bylaws.

(f). The duties of the Immediate Past Chair shall be to serve as Chair of the Finance Committee and as Chair of the Nominating Committee.

(g). The duties of the Councilors and Alternate Councilors shall be to represent the Division on the Council, as provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the SOCIETY.

Section 3. The Division shall have a Board of Directors known as the Executive Committee, which shall consist of the officers, the Immediate Past Chair of the Division, the Chair of each Subdivision, and four elected Members-at-Large. A quorum is defined as 50 % of the members of the Executive Committee.

Section 4(a). The offices of Chair and Chair-Elect are filled by automatic succession. Other officers shall be elected at a session of the Division meeting held at the fall meeting, with the exception of Councilors and Alternate Councilors.

(b). One nomination for each office to be filled, with the exception of Councilors and Alternate Councilors, shall be made by a Nominating Committee at least 30 days prior to the fall meeting of the SOCIETY. This committee shall submit a report in writing at the business meeting of the Division. Any five members present at the meeting may make additional nominations from the floor. If there is one nomination for an office, voting may be by show of hands. Otherwise, it shall be by secret ballot. A majority of ballots cast shall be required to elect.

(c). One nomination for each position of Councilor and each position of Alternate Councilor shall be made by the Nominating Committee at or prior to the spring meeting of the SOCIETY in the years at the end of which the term of one or more of these positions expires. The Committee shall submit its report in writing to the Secretary, and it shall be made known promptly to the Division members. Additional nominations may be made by any five members in writing to the Secretary before July 1 of that year.

(d). Councilors and Alternate Councilors shall be elected by a mail ballot of the members of the Division. The Chair shall notify the Secretary (or other designated Division officer) of the need to hold an election and simultaneously, appoint one or more Tellers to assist with counting the ballots.

The Secretary (or other designated Division officer) shall prepare an election ballot on which shall appear the names for each office, in order chosen by lot, of all candidates found willing to serve. The ballot will require a handinscribed signature on the outside of the ballot for the purpose of verification of membership. A period of at least three weeks must be provided between the date of the mailing of the ballots to the members and the deadline for their return to the Secretary (or other designated Officer of the Division). The Secretary (or other designated Officer of the Division) shall deliver, unopened, to the Tellers all ballots received by the deadline. The Tellers shall count the ballots thus received, using the list of members provided by the Secretary to verify eligibility of all those voting. Any ballot from an ineligible person shall be rejected. In case of a tie vote for any Councilor or Alternate Councilor opening, the Executive Committee shall make the final selection.

Section 5(a). The Chair, Chair-Elect, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Division shall serve for one year or until their successors are elected.

(b). The terms of office of the Members-at-Large of the Executive Committee shall be three years. A maximum of two members shall be elected in any single year. The Members-at-Large shall perform such duties as directed by the Chair of the Division and as are needed to support the activities of the Division.

(c). The terms of all officers, including Councilors and Alternate Councilors, shall begin on January 1 of the year following election.

(d). In the event of a vacancy in the office of Chair, the Chair-Elect shall assume the added duties of the Chair for the unexpired term. In the event of a vacancy in the office of Chair-Elect, the Vice-Chair shall assume the added duties of the Chair-Elect for the unexpired term. The Executive Committee shall fill vacancies in the offices other than Chair and Chair-Elect by appointment, agreed to by a majority of the Executive Committee. Incumbents so selected shall serve until January 1 following the next meeting at which regular elections are held, with the following exception. Vacancies in the office of Councilor (or Alternate Councilor) shall be elected to serve the remainder of the term.

BYLAW V

Recall of Elected Officials

Section 1. The elected officials of the Division (Officers or elected Members-at-Large) are subject to recall for neglect of duties or conduct injurious to the SOCIETY.

Section 2. The recall of an official shall be initiated when a signed petition, indicating in writing the specific charges and reasonable substantiating evidence, is submitted to the Chair from at least five (5) voting members of the Division. In the event the Chair is the official in question, the Vice-Chair or Chair-Elect shall receive the petition and shall assume the duties of the Office of Chair with respect to this issue until the

AGFD BYLAWS (continued)

issue is resolved.

Section 3. The Chair shall without delay determine that the petitioners are aware of the gravity of their actions and the procedures to be followed. The Chair shall seek an alternate resolution to the problem and a withdrawal of the petition at this time. In the absence of a resolution to the problem, the Chair shall notify the members of the Executive Committee and call a special meeting within thirty (30) days.

(a) The Executive Committee shall promptly continue the removal process or dismiss the petition as ill-founded or find an alternative solution to the problem. The Chair shall promptly inform the petitioners and the official of the decision of the Executive Committee.

(b) If the proceedings continue, the Chair shall assign the duties of the official to another member of the division until the issue is resolved.

(c) If the proceedings continue, the official shall be offered an opportunity to answer the allegations in the petition before the Executive Committee.

(d) If the proceedings continue, the official in question shall choose one of the following options:

(1) The official may resign.

(2) The official may request a recall vote in the same manner as the original election, which must be consistent with the Division bylaws. The voting membership shall be informed, through brief written statements prepared by the Executive Committee and the official, of the issues involved with the recall vote. Both statements shall be given to the voting membership before the vote is taken.

(3) The official may request a hearing and recall vote by the remaining members of the Executive Committee. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the remaining members of the Executive Committee shall be required to recall the official.

(4) The official may choose not to respond and thus forfeit the position.

Section 4. The vacancy provisions of the bylaws shall be used to fill a vacancy caused by a recall process. The membership of the Division and the Executive Director of the SOCIETY shall be informed of the results of the recall process and replacement of the official.

BYLAW VI Councilors

Councilors and Alternate Councilors shall have a term of office of three years. Alternate Councilors shall serve only for specific meetings of the Council that a Councilor is not able to attend.

BYLAW VII Committees

Section 1. There shall be a Program Committee, consisting of three or more members, one of whom shall be the Chair-Elect of the Division, who shall serve as Chair of the Committee. A second member of the Committee shall be Vice-Chair. The Program Committee shall have the entire responsibility for organizing the program of papers for all Division meetings. It shall work cooperatively with other Divisions of the SOCIETY in planning joint sessions and programs of mutual and timely interest.

Section 2. There shall be a Membership Committee of three or more members. This Committee shall aggressively promote membership in the Division by members of the SOCIETY.

Section 3. There shall be an Auditing Committee of two or more members. This Committee shall audit the accounts of the Treasurer prior to the business meeting of the Division and report its findings at the annual meeting.

Section 4. There shall be a Nominating Committee consisting of the Immediate Past Chair of the Division and at least two other members, appointed by the Executive Committee.

Section 5. Special committees may be appointed to consider, conduct, and report upon such special matters as may be delegated to them.

Section 6. Except where otherwise provided, the Chair shall make committee appointments, with the advice and approval of the Executive Committee.

BYLAW VIII Dues

Section 1. Members and National Affiliates of the Division shall pay annual dues not exceeding \$50.00, the exact amount to be decided annually by the Executive Committee. Dues are payable in advance. Members in emeritus status of the Division shall be granted all privileges of Division membership without the payment of annual dues.

Section 2. Division Affiliates shall pay annual dues of \$2.00 more than members. The exception will be Division Affiliates who are regularly matriculated students specializing in agriculture, or a chemical science, who shall pay annual dues not to exceed \$20.00.

Section 3. The Executive Committee may levy a surcharge to members and affiliates who reside outside of the United States and who express, in writing, a desire to have Division mailings sent to them by air mail.

BYLAW IX Subdivisions

Section 1. The Division may sponsor Subdivisions devoted to specialized fields within the area of Division interest. Membership, Division affiliation, or national affiliation in the Divi-

AGFD BYLAWS (continued)

sion shall be a requirement for participation in a Subdivision. Subdivisions are responsible to the Division and must operate in conformity with the bylaws of the Division.

Section 2. Formation or discontinuance of a Subdivision shall be at the discretion of the Executive Committee of the Division. Steps to initiate a Subdivision may be made by petition of a group of Division members to the Executive Committee or by the action of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall define the scope of activities of any Subdivision.

Section 3. Upon approval of the formation of a Subdivision, the Executive Committee of the Division shall appoint a Chair, Chair-Elect, Vice-Chair, and Secretary for the Subdivision. The Chair-Elect shall assume the office of Chair after one year, the Vice-Chair shall assume the office of the Chair-Elect after one year, and the Secretary shall assume the duties of Vice-Chair after one year. In succeeding years, the Subdivision shall elect, at the annual meeting, a Secretary. Only MEMBERS of the SOCIETY who are members of a Subdivision shall be eligible to hold elective positions.

Section 4. The necessary expenses for each Subdivision shall be authorized by the Executive Committee of the Division from Division funds and shall be paid by the Treasurer of the Division upon the usual authentication.

BYLAW X Meetings

Section 1. There shall be a meeting of the Division at each national meeting of the Society unless the Executive Committee votes otherwise, provided the requirements for a minimum number of meetings as specified in the SOCIETY BYLAWS shall be met. At least one technical session will be held annually.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Division shall be held at the fall meeting of the SOCIETY. The order of business shall be as follows:

- (1) Report of the Executive Committee
- (2) Report of the Secretary
- (3) Report of the Treasurer
- (4) Reports of the committees
- (5) Unfinished business
- (6) New business
- (7) Election of officers

In addition, a regular business meeting of the Division may be held at the spring meeting of the SOCIETY if called by the Executive Committee for consideration of bylaw amendments and other business requiring a vote of the membership, provided notice is given to the membership in writing at least two months in advance of the meeting.

Section 3. Special meetings of the Division may be called by the Executive Committee, provided notice is given to the membership in writing or by publication in Chemical and

Engineering News at least two months in advance. Special meetings may not be held within one month before or after a national meeting.

Section 4. Ten members of the Division shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of business.

Section 5. The Executive Committee in accordance with the Bylaws of the SOCIETY shall decide the fee for registration at any special meeting.

BYLAW XI Papers

Section 1. The Executive Committee, a Papers Committee appointed by the Chair, or an officer of the Division designated by the Executive Committee shall be empowered to approve or reject papers submitted for presentation before any meeting of the Division.

Section 2. The rules for papers presented before meetings of the Society as outlined in the Bylaws and Regulations of the SOCIETY shall govern the Division.

BYLAW XII Amendments

Section 1. Proposed amendment(s) shall be submitted in writing to the Secretary sixty days (60) prior to the meeting at which it will be considered by the Executive Committee. Upon approval of the Executive Committee, the Secretary shall send the text of the proposed amendment(s) to the SOCIETY Committee on Constitution and Bylaws for review. Upon preliminary approval of the proposed amendment by the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, the Secretary shall send the text of the proposed amendment(s) to the members of the Division at least thirty (30) days prior to the meeting at which it will be considered by the membership. These bylaws may be amended at any annual or regular business meeting of the Division by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided there is a quorum.

Section 2. Amendments shall become effective upon approval by the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, acting for the Council of the SOCIETY, unless a later date is specified in the amendment.

BYLAW XIII Dissolution

Upon dissolution of the Division, any assets of the Division remaining thereafter shall be conveyed to such organization then existent as is dedicated to objects similar to those of the Division and the AMERICAN CHEMICAL SOCIETY, or to the AMERICAN CHEMICAL SOCIETY, so long as whichever organization is selected by the governing body of the Division at the time of dissolution shall be exempt under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as amended or under such successor provision of the Code as may be in effect at the time of the Division's dissolution.
