Obituaries

Richard C. Brown, 81, of Enfield, CT, died February 24th, 2007. A World War II veteran, he retired from the Westvaco Envelope Division where he was laboratory director. He graduated from Clark University with a MS in chemistry received an MBA from Western New England College. He was past chairman and fellow of the Technical Association of the Pulp and Paper Industry, past treasurer of the New England Institute of Chemists, and was active in the ACS. He was very involved in organizations benefiting individuals with mental retardation.

John D. Buck, 71, died in early December 2006. A longtime professor at UConn, he taught for more than 40 years, professor emeritus of marine sciences, who graduated from that institution. (Your editor remembers him as a wonderful lab instructor in Bacteriology 105 at UConn, many years ago.) Although not an ACS member, he nevertheless will be greatly missed.

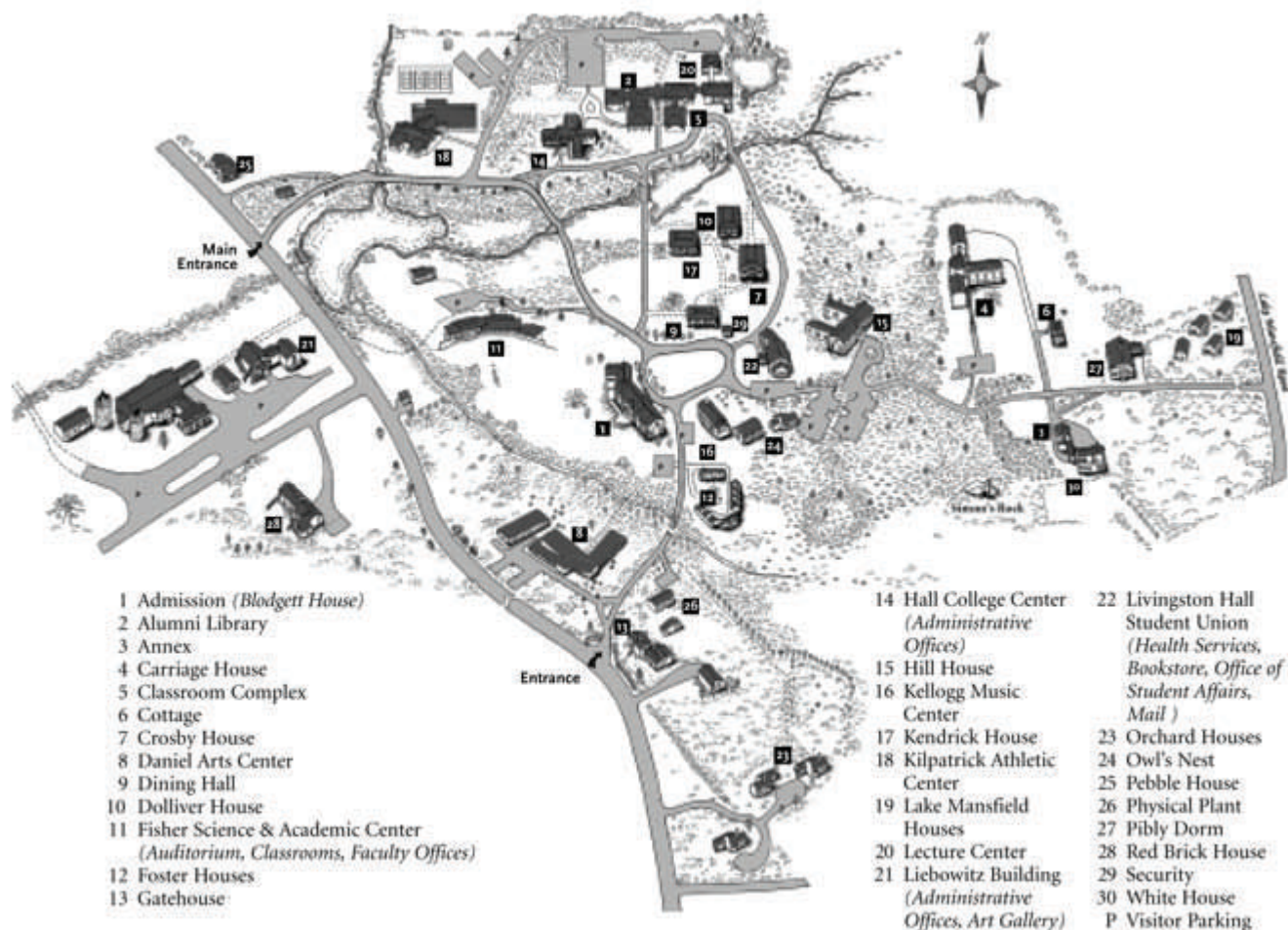

Dr. John Edwards to Present the 24th Annual Nora Harrington Lecture at Elms College

The 24th annual **Nora Harrington Lecture** will be held at Elms College in Chicopee, Massachusetts on Tuesday, April 17, 2007 at 7:30 p.m. in the Alumnae Library Theatre. The speaker is Dr. John Edwards, Manager of Process and Analytical NMR Services, Process NMR Associates, LLC, Danbury, CT. The title of the lecture is

“The Wonderful World of Non-Traditional NMR Spectroscopy”

The Nora Harrington Lectures are jointly sponsored by the Connecticut Valley section of the American Chemical Society and the Elms College Chemistry Department. The lecture series was inaugurated in 1983 to honor the 32 years of teaching service of Sr. Nora Harrington to Elms College. A Social Hour, featuring wine and hors d'oeuvres is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. in the Dining Room Annex of Mary Dooley College Center (Dining Room Annex is on the main level – at the right of Dining Room). The Social Hour is free to CVS members and invited guests. A reception will immediately follow the lecture.

Abstract

Over the past 60 years NMR has developed into a premier spectroscopic tool in the academic and industrial world. Superconducting spectrometers with fields ranging from 7 to 23 Tesla are considered as typical NMR equipment and NMR cold probes, operating at near liquid helium temperatures, are now hot items to improve sensitivity and throughput. NMR technology has also found other application areas to exploit and these areas are a far cry from a laboratory environment. Permanent magnet based NMR systems are currently used to map the underground hydrocarbon-water makeup of oil drilling wells and to control huge production units in refineries and chemical plants based on observed proton chemistry. Portable NMR systems are taken into the field for on the spot analysis of agricultural products, Antarctic ice, elastomer performance, concrete and wood moisture analysis. Single-sided NMR probe/magnet sensors are being used to study degradation of antique books, frescoes, and paintings. The non-traditional NMR technology and applications will be described and the economic benefits of the applications will be discussed. The future of NMR will include small, affordable, automated systems that will make NMR a much less exotic technique reserved only for large budget industrial or academic facilities.

Speaker Biography

Dr. Edwards received his B.Sc. in Chemistry from Durham University in the UK (1986), and then received his Ph.D. in Physical Chemistry from the University of South Carolina in 1990. His doctoral studies involved solid-state NMR of catalyst materials. He was responsible for all NMR services with Texaco Inc from 1990-97 where he developed his particular expertise in petroleum and petrochemical NMR. In 1997 began Process NMR Associates which is involved in application of high resolution NMR spectroscopy for on-line process control as well as providing commercial analytical NMR service to over 250 industrial and academic customers around the world. Over the past 20 years Dr. Edwards has developed an expertise in many types of non-traditional NMR equipment and applications.

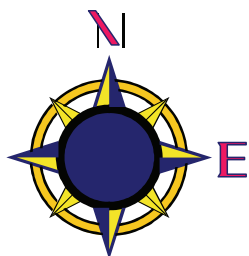

2007 Connecticut Separation Science Council Csaba Horváth Medal to be presented to Professor Eli Grushka

Professor Eli Grushka of the Department of Inorganic and Analytical Chemistry of The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, Israel will be the recipient of the 2007 Connecticut Separation Science Council's Seventh Csaba Horváth Medal. The presentation of this medal, which honors the contributions to the fields of separation science by our Society's founder, is awarded annually to a recognized person in the separation science field whose work in the past has exemplified and will provide for the advancement of separation science in the future. The medal will be presented to Professor Grushka by the CSSC President, Dr. Nelu Grinberg, at a two-day symposium to be held on Thursday and Friday, April 19-20, 2007 at the Hartford, CT, USA Convention Center. Past recipients of the medal have been Prof. Csaba Horváth (2000), Dr. Leslie Ettore (2001), Prof. William Hancock (2002), Prof. Harold McNair (2003), Prof. Phyllis Brown (2004) and Dr. Llyod Snyder (2005). Additional History to the CSSC and the Csaba Horváth Medal

It has been in the spring of each year that the Connecticut Separation Science Council (CSSC) holds a symposium and presents to a distinguished separation scientist the CSSC Csaba Horváth medal. A brief history of the CSSC, and the evolution of the medal award follows: In 1982, Csaba Horváth of Yale University and Leslie Ettore, then associated with Yale University, formally of PerkinElmer Corporation, founded the Connecticut Chromatography Council (CCC). The CCC held its first symposium, "CCC '83" at Yale University and hosted 200 attendees. In the following year, the CCC served as the sponsoring organization for "HPLC '84", held in New York City with an attendance of around 3000. In 1988, the organization was reincorporated as the New England Chromatography Council (NECC). In 1992, the NECC held its third symposium "Chromatography for the Nineties and Beyond" in Danbury, CT with 200 attendees. In 1998, while still remaining legally incorporated as the New England Chromatography Council, the Officers and Board of Directors agreed to start a subsidiary organization known as the Connecticut Separation Science Council (CSSC). The purpose of this name change was to reflect a broadened scope, as separation science encompasses all the separation sciences including mass spectroscopy in the broadest sense. In 1998 the organization held its fourth symposium, "CSSC '98" in Danbury, CT with 150 attendees. And in 2004 the CSSC its fifth major symposium "CSSC 2004" at Mohegan Sun Conference Center also with 150 attendees.

Evolution of the Csaba Horváth Medal

It was during the 1999 CSSC Annual Board Meeting held usually in Mason Lab that Csaba first suggested the establishment of a CSSC Medal in order to lend greater stature to the CSSC. The CSSC minutes of that meeting make note that the medal shall:

"...be awarded to a recognized person in the separation science whose contributions to the field has exemplified and will continue to provide for the advancement of separation science in the future."

As a surprise, the Board then, on January 25, 2000, at the occasion of his 70th birthday, presented the first CSSC Csaba Horváth Medal to Csaba himself. The second medal was presented to Dr. Leslie Etre on March 27, 2001, the third medal to Dr. William S. Hancock on March 22, 2002, the fourth medal to Professor Harold McNair on May 9, 2003, the fifth medal to Phyllis Brown on April 30, 2004, and the sixth medal to Lloyd Snyder on April 9, 2005.

III. ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM THE CHAIR.

IV. OFFICERS AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Chair - only one application for the Burlew Award has been received.

Chair-Elect - Spread the word about the dinner meetings - only 15 reservations received to date for the October meeting. Pfizer is subsidizing the meeting (\$125.00 donation) to pay for the podium, screen, and bar set up. Cost of both dinner meetings is \$25.00.

Past Chair - Nominating Committee - Ballot is close to being finished. Looking for candidates for two member-at-large positions, one opening for Councilor, one for Alternate Councilor. Chair-Elect candidate is David Myers.

Councilors: Dr. Kozlowski announced that she was not seeking re-election after serving the CVS Executive Board for 21 years (18 as Councilor). She is re-locating to Florida to enjoy her retirement. The Board applauded her for her years of service. The Councilors reported on the ACS National meeting in San Francisco in September:

- There is a downloadable version of the revised version of Safety in the Chemical Laboratory on the ACS Web Site. The open discussion period centered on the future of ACS. They want to get more young people involved, but it is not advisable for pre-tenure people to be too active.
- There will be a NOVA program on Percy Julian "Forgotten Genius" in February
- There were a record number of papers presented (nearly 10,000).

Education - No report. Dr. Craine announced that Ed Fitzgerald would be doing a NCW event at the Holyoke Mall Saturday, Oct. 21 from 11:00 AM - 3:00 PM.

National Chemistry Week (NCW) - It will take place Oct. 22-28; theme is "Your Home - It's Built on Chemistry." Dr. Anderson will be sending out information to those teachers/schools who have requested materials.

Northeast Region Board - Dr. Smist announced that the next NERM would be in Binghamton, NY on October 5- 7, 2006. The Northeast Region Board will be meeting then. She requested approval from the CVS Board to bring a bid to the Region Board for CVS to host the NERM 2009.

Student Affairs - J. Knox. Undergraduate symposium will be held at Simon's Rock College. Received innovative grant to bring in high school teachers to do demos, show them how to do them, give them materials, and show how to use them to illustrate different concepts. Two programs in the spring for about 25 high school teachers each
